DINING WITH ALICE





hen Helen Marriage, Director of the Salisbury Festival, invited us to create a show based on Alice in Wonderland for the Larmer Tree Gardens, we were immediately impressed by the appropriateness of the site for the subject. One of the characteristics of 'site specific' work is an innate sympathy between content and location. The Larmer Tree is a Victorian creation with all the features particular to an age of colonial travel: the Indian House, the Roman Temple, ponds, peacocks and splendid gardens. The elements of the site are in some ways incongruous yet they have been made harmonious by General Pitt Rivers, the garden's designer. In the same way, Lewis Carroll's account of Alice's Adventures succeeds in creating a world wherein the most preposterous types do not seem out of place. Thus garden and story have much in common.

Given such a site we felt it was important to expose the audience to as much of the gardens as possible. A useful cue was to be found in the seating arrangements for the Mad Hatter's Tea Party.

In DINING WITH ALICE, characters from Wonderland are released from the moderating influence of the young Alice and are free to create mayhem. As they escort their guests around the grounds, they confound their guests' expectations of a sedate and elegant soirce.

The voice of common sense, however, is not entirely absent. The ever vigilant Alice lies in wait to restrain the impulsive and absurd characters should their behaviour become unseemly.

DINING WITH ALICE celebrates the power of the imagination in a battle between anarchy and order, reason and insanity.



Biographies

Annabelle Cheetham The White Queen Annabelle was born in New Zealand and later studied at Trinity College of Music, she has appeared in many Opera Factory productions and performed many varied recital and concert engagements. Although her roles include Marcellina, Le Nouze Di Figure; Olga, Engene Onogin and Bianca, Rape of Lucretia, she also enjoys the less traditional platform, such as Station House Opera's performance of The Salisbury Proverbs at the 1997 Salisbury Festival.

Simon Corder Lighting Designer
On leaving school, Simon Corder joined the circus and later learned his craft as a technician in touring theatre and opera. His career includes over 100 lighting designs for opera, theatre, dance, in situations ranging from Europe's finest Opera Houses to studios at the cutting edge of the avant-garde.

John Del 'Nero Sound Designer

John has worked in sound for 27 years, during
this time he has designed an extensive range of
different productions, from musical theatre to
large scale outdoor events, such as VE Day in
Hyde Park. John is also designing a new sound
system for Salisbury Cathedral. During this period
he has tried to learn how to fish for trout using a
fly and sail a dingy, he is still a poor novice at
both. John lives with Alison Ritchie in Berwick
St. John.

David Gale Text

David Gale co-founded Lumiere & Son Theatre Company with director Hilary Westlake in 1973 and for twenty years wrote most of the company's shows. He has published a novel, written an opera for Channel 4 and documentaries for TV and radio. In October 1999 his new performance 'I Am Dandy' opens in London.

Heather Keens The Duchess

Heather Keens trained at the Royal College of Music and has worked extensively in contemporary and classical opera and theatre in this country and in Australia. Her recent work ranges from performances with the Queensland Symphony Orchestra to solos with the Meryl Tankard Dance Company. She sings with a jazz trio Songlines, and has regularly collaborated with Hilary Westlake and Frank Millward.

Ralph Oswick Tweedle Dum & Dee Ralph Oswick is a founder member of the Natural Theatre Company of Bath with whom he has performed since 1969. As Artistic Director he has had overall responsibility for the company's design, direction and policy, he has performed with the company worldwide. He has worked previously with Hilary Westlake including a project for Expo 88 in Australia.

Katy McPhee Costume Designer
Katy McPhee trained at Wimbledon School of Art
gaining a BA Hons in Theatre Design. She works
in film, TV and theatre. Most recently she has
designed costumes for DV8 Physical Theatre.

Roddy Maude Roxby Mr. Alastair Roddy studied painting at the Royal College of Art, he was a founder member of Theatre Machine, Britain's first Theatre of Improvisation and Alice's Diner Theatre Company, which devised 8 shows between 1990 and 1998. Roddy has toured extensively in the UK and abroad, he also teaches masks and improvisation in London, Cambridge and the USA.


Frank Millward Composer

Frank is currently finishing PhD studies in music composition at the University of Queensland, Australia. In the eighties Frank worked with Hilary Westlake & David Gale on nine Lumiere & Son productions, the most notable, Brightside won the Perrier Pick of the Fringe Award in 1986. For the last 13 years Frank has written music for television, theatre as well as a number of pop albums (Michael Hutchence, Noiseworks & Eurogliders). Frank has also taught contemporary music at a number of Australian Universities.

Howard Moody Musical Direction & Conductor Howard Moody is conductor of the Salisbury Festival Chorus and Sarum Chamber Orchestra. He has also conducted BBC Symphony Orchestra, Halle, Bournemouth Sinfonietta, Orchestra of St. John's, Opera Factory, Icelandic Opera, Netherlands Radio Chorus. As a pianist and composer he has worked with classical, jazz, Indian and world musicians.

Orlando Schenk The White Knight
Orlando Schenk studied at Durham University
and the Guildhall School of Music and Drama.
Recent engagements include Papageno in The
Magic Flute for British Youth Opera, Elviro in
Xerxes for the Early Opera Company, Zuniga in
Carmen, Jake Wallace in La Fanciulla Del West
for Wexford Festival Opera, and Ensemble in Don
Giovanni with Peter Brook and Claudio Abbado
at the Aix-en Provence Festival. He studies with
Robert Dean.

Diane Sherlock The Queen of Hearts
Di has worked extensively in repertory, touring &
music theatre. Productions include Garmenghast
for the David Glass Ensemble, The Rase Tattoo
with The Peter Hall Company, The Soldier's Tale
with the Scottish Chamber Orchestra, Lumiere &
Son's Brightside. Her Musical Murder Mystery,
Who Killed Ramona Rhapsody will premiere with
the BBC Philharmonic at The Rippon Music
Festival in September.



Gary Stevens The White Rabbit
Gary Stevens has created solo and group
performances for gallery and theatre contexts
since 1984, ranging from If the caps fits,
Different Ghous, and Animal ← Name, which
toured extensively. His recent work has included
AND, presented at MOMA, his solo Thread
presented in the UK & New York & a work for
radio, ROBIN HOOD: The Stuff, Gary was a
recipient of the 1998 Paul Hamlyn Award for
visual arts.

Trevor Stuart The Mad Hatter
Trevor Stuart. Australian. Scientist. Studied mime
in Paris. Worked with Lumiere & Son for fifteen
years. Also Pip Simmons, Impact, The Fall,
Django Bates, Natural Theatre of Bath, Directed
National Youth Theatre, choreographed at
Glyndebourne, taught in Finland. One man
shows - Tabso, At home with Ted Bunny.
Electronic installation - the Information Tango,
Has been seen on BBC1, BBC2, ITV, Channel 4
& MTV.

Fiona Tanner The Red Queen
Fee studied with late Gustav Sacher, whilst
working with the Mayer-Liamann Opera Centre,
Morley College Opera and London Music
Theatre. In 1994 she received a BSc Hons from
the City University and the Guildhall School of
Music and Drama, where she studied with David
Pollard. Recitals include: charity work for Save the
Children at the Shawford Mill Theatre & concerts
in Nice, France and in Italy at the Montalcino
International Festival.

Kevin West The King of Hearts

Born in London, Kevin studied at the Guildhall
School of Music & Drama. He has worked
extensively in classical opera in the UK and
abroad, including roles with companies such as,
the Royal Opera House, D'Oyly Carte, ENO,
Opera Northern Ireland & Glyndebourne
Touring Opera. Kevin has also been involved with
baroque music and has recorded the works of the
Regency composer Charles Dibdin for Hyperion
Records.

Hilary Westlake Director
Hilary Westlake is the Artistic Director of
Lumiere & Son Theatre Company, which she
formed with David Gale in 1973, specialising in
large scale site specific and music theatre
productions. She also works as freelance
writer/director both on the creation of new work
and existing texts and operas. Recent work
includes The Secret Sign, a promenade
performance set in a gorge outside Glasgow, A
Midrummer Fire Festival for EXPO 98 in Lisbon
and II Mondo della Luna by Haydn at the Buxton
Festival.
